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#### **Pennoweth News**

#### **Lower Keystage Two**

This week, children in Lower Key Stage Two have returned from the half-term break excited to begin their brand-new project: Misty Mountain Sierra. With a strong focus on science and geography, pupils have been busy exploring the world around them in new and exciting ways.

As scientists, the children have learned about the four main stages of the water cycle – evaporation, condensation, precipitation and collection – and have begun to understand how water moves around our planet.

As geographers, pupils have named, located and explained the importance of some of the world's most significant mountains and rivers. They have also worked on comparing the physical features of different mountainous regions, developing their skills in observation and description.

As writers, the children have also explored Calligrams - poems where the words are arranged in a shape that reflects the poem's subject. Did you know that the word 'Calligramme' comes from French, meaning "beautiful writing"? As part of this work, pupils have been learning about figurative language and how to use it to bring their poetry to life. They've experimented with alliteration, similes, metaphors, personification and onomatopoeia, and have worked hard to include these exciting features in their own shape poems.

It's been a fantastic start to the half term, and we're looking forward to seeing where the Misty Mountain adventure takes our Year 3 & 4 children next!

#### **Upper Keystage 2**

It has been a busy week in 5/6 this week! We have started our new topic 'Hola Mexico', and children have been busy bees creating their own Mayan myth based on two different Ancient Mayan stories. Something that everyone has enjoyed this week has been our drama session role playing characters from the myths; we have spotted some amazing actors in UKS2! Our new novel 'Alone on a Wide, Wide Sea', by Michael Morpurgo, has gripped all of us and even though we are only a few chapters in, we cannot wait to see what happens to Arthur and Marty in the book! Next week, we will be doing a whole week on our sustainability curriculum, thinking about all things climate change and sustainable, we look forward to sharing photos next Friday!



**Unauthorised Exceptional Leave of Absence Information** 

The law requires parents to ensure their children receive an efficient full time education, and every minute of every day is important. Please help them not to miss any of the valuable time.

We hope that when you read the information outlined on our website, you will consider that your child's education is too important to take on

holidays during term time.

If an unauthorised leave of absence is taken, this may incur a penalty

notice being issued under Section 444A and 444B of the education Act 1996. This carries a fine of £60 if paid within 21 days or £120 if paid after this but within 28 days. Failure to pay the penalty notice will result in Court action.

#### **Unauthorised Late Information**

If your child is arriving late—after the register has closed at 8:50am it will be coded as a U which, is an unauthorised late mark. If your child accrues 10 unauthorised late marks within 100 sessions (10 weeks) you will be

committing an offence under the Education Act 1996.

The School may refer the matter to Cornwall Council who may decide to take legal action against you, issuing a penalty notice under section 444A and 444B of the Education Act 1996. This carries a fine of £60 per child, per parent if paid within 21 days or £120 if paid after this but within 28 days. Failure to pay the penalty notice will result in Court action.

Persistent absences/unauthorised lates, not authorised by the school, may result in a prosecution in the Magistrates Court, leading to fines up to £2500 and/or custodial sentences.



Do you find yourself called upon to support more and more autistic students? Are you finding families are reporting struggles at home? Do you have autistic students who avoid attending?

Join Dr Jo Grace for a humorous research informed day that looks at the underpinning causes for these difficulties, identifies hidden stressors and offers practical solutions/reasonable accommodations that you may be able to make to make your setting more accessible for autistic students.

You will go away from this day with:

- Insight into the cause of the apparent surge in autism
- Understanding of the neurobiological differences in autistic people
- Awareness of hidden barriers that may be present in your setting.
- · Information about how sensory difference effect access to spaces
- Ideas for adaptations that can be made within an environment to empower all students (not just the autistic ones)
- Tools for evaluating whether proposed strategies are likely to be effective
- Tips for being neuro affirming
- Strategies for supporting neurodiverse families
- Reflections to support your own well being as you seek to do the right thing by your students and their families

Jo Grace has worked as a teacher and teaching assistant within schools in <u>Cornwall, and</u> also been a registered foster carer for children in Cornwall. Jo has also been an autistic student at school in Cornwall and so is able to bring personal insight to her work. She has a <u>masters in Special Education</u> and a PhD in Identity and Belonging for people with profound disabilities. Her books sell globally and Jo consults nationally and internationally on matters relating to autism, sensory differences and profound disability. She sees her role as being the bridge between research and practice and wants to support you as you create more inclusive education communities.
