Nursery Learning Highights

This week in Nursery, we introduced our new topic, "Me and My Community." The children loved exploring our "talking box," using the items inside to share about themselves, their families, Redruth and the people who help us. It was a lovely way to build confidence and learn more about each other!







EYFS Learning Highlights

In Reception we have been looking at the changing season and thinking about how Autumn is different fro the Summer. We have collected some natural materia from our outdoor area and used them to make transie art inspired by the story Leaf Man by Lois Ehlert. In Mathwe have spoken about circles and triangles.

Key Stage One Learning Highlights

In Year 1, we have learnt Michael Rosen's poem 'Rhythm of Life' and explored creating our own poems using our senses. In art, we have made portraits of our faces. In science, we have started learning how to identify similarities and differences between animals and humans.

In Year 2, we have enjoyed learning and performing 'Ning Nang Nong' by Spike Milligan. Using this as their inspiration, the children have been creating their own poems and had great fun creating nonsense words. In science, we have begun to explore habitats and understand that a habitat must provide food, water, shelter and space.













Lower Key Stage Two Learning Highlights

Year 3 enjoyed carrying out an experiment to explore how it takes more energy for water to travel up taller trees. To demonstrate this, the children attached straws together and tested how many they could drink through. They discovered that the more straws they added, the harder it was to drink, just like with trees!

In year 4 this week, we have made the most of a 4-day week and re-written the poem 'Lullaby of Iroquois' by Emily Pauline Johnson focusing on rhyming words and patterns. Look out for our versions in the newsletter! We also began our maths unit on area and looked at and named the countries within North and South America in Geography.

Upper Key Stage Two Learning Highights

Upper Key Stage Two returned from half term to a short — but busy — four-day week and jumped straight into their brand-new project: Frozen Kingdom, which will see them exploring the planet's coldest places over the next seven weeks. Pupils kick-started with geography: recapping the Equator, the Northern and Southern Hemispheres, the Tropics of Cancer and Capricorn, and the lines of latitude and longitude — before using this knowledge to identify the polar regions, focusing on the Arctic and Antarctica.

Online Safety

At the National College, our WakeUp/Wednesday guides empower and equip parents, corers and educators with the confidence and practical skills to be able to have informed and age-appropriate conversations with children about online safety, mental health and wellbeing, and climate change. 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What Parents & Educators Need to Know about

FORTNITE

WHAT ARE THE RISKS? With over 650 million registered users, Fortnite remains one of the most played and discussed online games globally. Known for its vibrant graphics, fast-paced gameplay, and cultural crossovers with everything from music artists to superhero franchises, the game continues to capture the attention of young people. This guide outlines the risks trusted adults need to know about, including game updates, and offers practical safety tips to help address them.

ALWAYS ONLINE

There's no single-player, effiline mode in Forthike, it can only be played online, internet occass can sometimes be an issue when you're out and about, both in terms of connectivity and using up dath. You may find that dedicated, young Forthike players are often less enthusiastic about family time or tripic away - such as days out and holidays - than you might expect.

IN-GAME COSTS

Fortnike is free to download and play, but it does ofter various additional purchases – firmited-time cosmetic takins, music tracks, LEGO litems, and bottle passes. Children com feel pressured to spend money on V-Bucks – the in-game currency – to avoid missing out, porticularly os exclusive interns rotate frequently. Some items may not return to the store for years, while bottle has rewards are often "gone when they're gone".

VIRTUAL VIOLENCE

There's no availating that Fortnike is about shooting other players to eliminate them from the contest. That sold, there's no blood or gore. The violence is rendered in a contronish style, and there are frequent comical touches to lighten the mood, such as mini-games and emotes. Guns and other weapons offen look and behave realistically, so discretion is advised. Past seasons have introduced characters and references from moture franchises like The Witcher and Holo.

CROSSPLAY AND PARTY CHAT

Fortinite is popular with many gamers of various ages. Crossplay allows friends to play with each other, regardless of whether they're on an Xbox, Play Station, Nintendo Switch or PC, while the Party Chot feature allows them to talk to each other during the game. This can put youngsters of risk of exposure to strangers, inappropriate language, and cyberbullying.

FREQUENT UPDATES

Seasonal releases introduce new map changes, gamejory mechanics, and cosmetics. Ongoing updates can increase screen time and potential for obsession as children try to unlock newards before the season ends. These regular renewals help to hold players' interest, but also give young gamers pierty of reasons to keep coming back. Seasons often changes thematically.

POP CULTURE REFERENCES

Port of Fortnite's appeal is its angoing crossivers with other papular franchises, sanging from films and TV shows like Power Rangers and Avotor: The Last Airbender, to comic book characters including Batman. Other collaborations with series, artists, and influencers may expose children to music, language, or ideas that are more suitable for older audiences.

Advice for Parents & Educators

DISCUSS SAFE SOCIAL INTERACTION

Talk with children about who they're playing with online. Coordinate play time with the child's triends for socialisation and safety in numbers. Encourage them to evoke private voice chats with strongers and remind them not to share personal information. Use real-life examples to explain potential risks, and remind them that if they see something concerning, they should talk a trusted adds.

Fortnite also afters split screan gameplay, meaning that two people can play simultaneously on the some conside or computer. This can be a good option for siblings or for when a child's kinede visit, but it also afters an apportunity for parents to do something fun with their child, while making sure they're playing the game solely. Who knows? You might even teach them a thing or two!

SET SPENDING LIMITS

Fortnitr's rotating store is a not-so-subtle mechanism for coasing players into buying sought-ofter items before they disoppear for weeks or months. This could lead to surprise transactions on bank cards if children are tempted into an impulse purchase. Parents could consider getting a prepoid coad for the child or ensuring that purchases require adult authorisation. This can be done through parental settings on a console or account settings in the facility Games app on PC.

BE WARY OF SCAMS

ENJOY FORTNITE TOGETHER

The immense popularity of fortnite with younger audiences - that are generally more trusting - means there's no shortage of scammers looking to housbulently obtain passwords and other personal data through techniques like phishing. As the developers point out an many of fortnite's looding screens, they never ask for a player's account password outside of the game. Make sure any young player


